Welcome to AP English Literature and Composition! You've made a big and important choice in selecting an advanced level course! To best prepare you for the next school year, you must complete the following Summer Assignment by the first day of classes in August.

Your Summer Assignment is in TWO PARTS. Both assignments are due the first day of class in August.

PART ONE

Read <u>How to Read Literature Like a Professor</u> by Thomas C. Foster.

As you read, you should annotate. You may annotate in any way you like, but we recommend using a <u>dialectical</u> journal or <u>Cornell notes</u>. You will be submitting these annotations on the first day. There is no minimum or maximum number of annotations for your book; you simply need to demonstrate that you are interacting with the text in a critical and thoughtful way, deriving your own meaning from what you've read.

PART TWO

Choose a novel from the list below and read it, BUT you should read it using the guidelines and tips that Foster suggests in <u>How to Read Literature Like a Professor</u>. You should annotate the book in any way you like. Again, using a dialectical journal or Cornell notes template will keep your thoughts organized and assist you to dig deeper into the text and the author's purpose.
